ACHIVEMENTS OF SMECAO FUND

From 1994 – 1998; The organization pioneered for awareness raising at community and institution level on environmental education, promotion of using energy saving technologies on both household charcoal and fuel wood (Mkombozi and Umeme Stove), promotion of afforestation activates. Use of renewable energy i.e. Solax II, SMECAO was linking sellers with buyers from the village. In saving energy SMECAO previously and currently promotes the use of risk husks in brick burning and promotion of Cinvar bricks i.e. Cement Soil bricks.

From 1998 – 2001: SMECAO continued with the same interventions but Cinvar brick making technology was dropped as people failed to purchase Cement

From 2002 – 2005: In this phase SMECAO continue with same intervention but Umeme Charcoal Stove was dropped as it become difficult to obtain materials for stove construction i.e. barrels. In this phase Institutional Mkombozi Stove was introduced as Food programs in schools came into effect.

From 2006 – 2009; The same intervention continued, and in this phase local animators from the village were trained on Solar installation and repairing.

From 2010 – 2013; The organisation went through major changes in term of project implemented and administration as its current intervention is on livelihood projects which fundamentally targets towards improving livelihood capacities of low income rural households to withstand socio economic and climate change stress.

On according to July 2013End of Project evaluation SMECAO have succeeded at training a total of 144 TOT's of Mkombozi Stove who achieved to construct a total of 2518 household stove and 29 Institutional stove out of a target of 1758 stoves.

Also a total of 26,280 trees seedlings were planted in the four wards and contributed to increasing carbon sink and protection of the environment.

Moreover about 480,000 bricks in one ward were burnt using rice husks instead of fuel wood thus 480m3 of fuel wood were saved which is approximately to 1,440 trees conserved

Through different side project such as UNDP – SGP/GEF - Tanzania and Artefact GgmbH Solivol/Welt warts program Germany more 92 TOT's of Mkombozi Fuel Efficient stove were trained in Mhezi, Mshewa and Chome. Were a total of 1429 Mkombozi household stove and 18 Mkombozi Institutional stove were built.

Moreover there has been an increased number of protected water sources from 0 to 5 in Vudee ward.


SMECAO has been sensitizing producers within the project area on the use of high yield drought resistant crop varieties as one of the coping strategies to counteract the effects of climatic changes. Findings from the evaluation shows that more than 120 farmers adopted the technology SMECAO through its Wash and SODIS technology intervention achieved to reduce cases of water borne diseases from 793 cases during 2010/2011 to 492 in 2011/2012 in Kwakoa dispensary; and in Kihurio dispensary cases reduced from 956 in 2010/2011 to 792 in 2011/2012. This has been revealed during evaluation as reported cases of intestinal diseases in primary school pupils reduced from 7 and 15 cases in a week to 0 and 3 cases respectively after intervention.

Increased number of land disputes settled at ward level from 10 cases 2009 to 92 cases and reduced appeal cases from ward tribunals to district tribunals to 3 cases from 10 disputes 2009 and 9 cases from 82 disputes 2012.

There is an income increase in the households as a result of community members engaging on poultry and bee keeping intervention
